# Oregon 2023 Legislative Session Brief

*In a session full of derision, lost time and looming disappointments, only one action has risen above the rest: Your advocacy.*

Two successes to focus on:

ODSVS (Oregon Domestic and Sexual Violence Services) Fund *"one time funding"*






- \$10M for distribution according to the equity formula
- \$6M for the survivor housing funds.

HB 2676, Crime Victims Compensation Reform:

- This reform to the victims compensation program funds and resources are made available for clean up at a crime scene or to help those who may be family to a victim, as they take time off of work to navigate the legal and/or medical ramifications of the crime. This bill also took on the crime of strangulation to optimize the response systems.

# Oregon's voice at the National level

In DC for Advocacy days with NNEDV & NAESV and the other state Coalitions.

Key Congressional Requests are:

1. Support Vital Funding for Survivors
2. Steady VOCA Funding & Sustainability of the Crime Victims Fund (CVF)

FY Appropriations Requests:

- \$2B Released to VOCA Fund
- VAWA: \$100M SASP; \$100M T-Housing; \$100M LAV; \$35M Culturally Specific
- \$526M FVPSA
- \$102M RPE
- \$90M DV/SA Bonus Funds/Other HUD Funds
- \$35M Culturally Specific Public Health Approach
- \$15M Funding to Address Immigrant Survivors

This annual survey documents the number of people who sought services in a single 24-hour period, as well as the types of services requested, the number of service requests that went unmet due to a lack of resources, and the issues and barriers domestic violence programs face in providing services to victims.

- The coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program, a part of the American Rescue Plan (ARPA), delivers \$350 billion to state, local, and Tribal governments across the country to support their response to and recovery from the COVID-19 public health emergency. The U.S. Treasury awarded approximately \$6.4 billion in total to the state of Oregon.
